Representing New Jersey and New York, Gotham FC plays its home matches at Red Bull Arena in Harrison, New Jersey.


Founded in 2007, Gotham FC originally debuted as Jersey Sky Blue and played in the United Soccer League's W-League. Later that year, it was selected to represent the New Jersey/New York metropolitan area in the newly founded Women's Professional Soccer (WPS) League set to begin operations in 2009. The club rebranded as Sky Blue FC and won its first trophy in the inaugural WPS Championship in 2009.

Sky Blue FC was one of eight teams to join the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL) in 2012 following the disbandment of the WPS. In April 2021, the club underwent a major rebrand and officially changed its name to NJ/NY Gotham FC. The name, logo, and colors were selected after extensive fan involvement and will guide the club into the future with bold international ambitions.

In the 2023 season, Gotham FC won its first NWSL Championship in club history, when it defeated OL Reign 2-1 in the finial. With the win, the club completed the best turnaround season-to-season in NWSL history, as Gotham FC went from worst to league champions in a single season.



OUTLINE CREST

The crest contains several elements that celebrate the club's growth and past. It prominently features the Statue of Liberty's iconic crown sitting atop the crest. A national monument, the Lady in the Harbor was voted the most recognizable symbol of New Jersey and New York by fans. Her crown represents Gotham FC's ambitions to be an international club and provides a welcoming symbol for the team's diverse fanbase.

The crest center proudly displays three letters in sky blue coloring – an "N" and a hybrid "J/Y", which acknowledges New Jersey as the club's birthplace while embracing the club's growing New York reach.

WORDMARK

The official colors of the club are Sky Blue, Gotham Black, and Cloud White. The colors represent the team's history and prior identity, the club's new identity, and the longstanding foundation of the club's supporters group, Cloud 9.

YAEL AVERBUCH WEST

GENERAL MANAGER AND HEAD OF SOCCER OPERATIONS

An accomplished business leader and former member of the U.S. National Team and standout collegiate and professional player, Yael Averbuch was named interim General Manager and Head of Soccer Operations of Gotham FC in August 2021 and officially took over the position four months later. Under her leadership, Gotham FC won the 2023 NWSL Championship.

Born in New York City and raised in Montclair, N.J., Averbuch developed as a player in youth programs in her home state before reaching the first of her two goals in the game: play for the University of North Carolina.

In her time at UNC, the Tar Heels won national championships in 2006 and 2008. Averbuch set the school record by starting 105 consecutive games, and she scored the fastest goal to begin a game in women's college soccer history (four seconds, against Yale in 2006). Among several honors during her collegiate career, Averbuch was named ACC Offensive Player of the Year in 2006, ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year for women's soccer in 2007, and was voted First Team All-America three times by the NSCAA coaches. Averbuch received the ultimate honor when North Carolina retired her No. 17 after her senior year.

Averbuch achieved her other childhood dream by earning 26 caps as a member of the U.S. National Team between 2007 – 2013. When she took the helm at Gotham FC in 2021, Averbuch became the first former women's national team player to be named general manager of an NWSL club.

Averbuch was selected by Sky Blue FC with the fourth overall pick in the 2009 WPS Draft and went on to help lead the club to the league championship that year. She won another WPS title with the Western NY Flash in 2011.

After two years playing in Russia and Sweden – which included competing in the UEFA Women's Champions League in 2012 – Averbuch played in the NWSL for five years between 2014 – 2018. This included an NWSL championship in 2015 during her three seasons with FC Kansas City, and one season each with the Washington Spirit and Seattle Reign.

While still playing in the NWSL, Averbuch began her career as an entrepreneur and business leader. In 2016, she launched Techne Futbol – an innovative app providing personal training for soccer players of all ages, experience and skill levels – and remains owner of the business today. In 2017, she founded the NWSL Players Association and served as the organization's first president and, later, its first executive director.

Now that she has come full circle as GM and Head of Soccer Operations for NJ/NY Gotham FC, Averbuch has returned to Montclair, where she lives with her husband and two children.





JUAN CARLOS AMORÓS

HEAD COACH

Juan Carlos Amorós was named Gotham FC head coach on Nov. 1, 2022. He led Gotham FC to win the 2023 NWSL Championship in his first season, and he was honored as NWSL Coach of the Year during that same campaign.

The 39-year-old Amorós joined Gotham FC on a three-year contract after he led the Houston Dash to a fourth-place finish and the team's first-ever NWSL playoff appearance while he was interim head coach in 2022.

Amorós brings a wealth of experience across global soccer to Gotham FC, having served as a head coach of clubs in the top leagues in Spain, England, and the U.S. Prior to his stint in Houston, Amorós was coach of Real Betis Féminas from 2021 – 22 and led them to a club–record unbeaten streak in Spain's top division.

Before Real Betis, Amorós enjoyed enormous success as a coach in England. Over five years, he helped lead Tottenham Hotspur FC Women from the third tier in England to the FA Women's Super League. In 2019, Tottenham was promoted to the Super League after finishing second in the second–division FA Women's Championship League. He earned Manager of the Year honors that season, and won the same honor while coaching Tottenham Hotspur in the third–division FA Women's National League.

In the 2022 NWSL season, Amorós began his tenure as interim head coach of the Houston Dash on July 16 with a 4–1 win over Chicago. He led Houston to a 6–3–2 record as the club earned the first playoff berth in its nine–year history.

Amorós holds a UEFA PRO license – the highest–level UEFA license attainable – and received a diploma in Football Management from the League Managers Association Institute of Leadership and High Performance. He has also participated in elite coaching courses with the Royal Spanish Football Federation, and in 2018 earned a Master of Business Administration from Autonomous University of Madrid.





JEN LALOR

ASSISTANT COACH

Jen Lalor joined Gotham FC in 2023. In addition to her duties as assistant coach, Lalor also will play an integral role for Gotham FC with the club's player development pipeline. Lalor won the bronze medal with the USWNT at the FIFA Women's World Cup in 1995 and played professionally in Japan, Denmark and Sweden. She also played in the first women's professional league in the U.S. (Women's United Soccer Association) with the New York Power and San Diego Spirit.

At Santa Clara University, Lalor was the first women's soccer player in school history to earn a full athletic scholarship and was later inducted into the SCU Athletic Hall of Fame.

Lalor has worked extensively at U.S. Soccer in the youth national team system as a coach, scout, technical advisor, and club development manager. As a head coach, she has led two teams to national championships: San Diego SeaLions of the WPSL in 2013 and Albion SC San Diego U16 in 2022.



SHAUN HARRIS

ASSISTANT COACH

Prior to joining the staff of Gotham FC in 2023, Shaun Harris spent the twelve seasons with Tottenham Hotspur, including years when Amorós was Head Coach of the women's team. As a senior member of the staff within the club's Global Football Development team, he traveled around the world to deliver coaching education and player development programs and help implement coaching curriculums within national football associations.

More recently, as lead technical coach, Harris played an integral role in helping Tottenham Hotspur Women reach fifth place in the table in 2021–22, its highest–ever finish in the Women's Super League.





AK LAKANI

ASSISTANT COACH

Ak Lakhani joined Gotham FC in 2023 from the Jamaican Football Federation, where he was the head of United Kingdom recruitment for the Women's U17, U20 and Senior Women's national team. He was also the assistant coach of the Jamaican Women's National Team that advanced to the Round of 16 in the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup, and was assistant coach when the team won the bronze medal at the 2022 Concacaf Women's Championship in Mexico. Lakhani was part of Amorós' coaching staff during his successful tenure at Tottenham Hotspur Women's FC when the club earned back–to–back promotions. He has also worked at Tottenham Hotspur Academy and Leyton Orient Academy, and he was one of 150 coaches in the UK to be awarded a Medal from Prince William for "Outstanding Contribution to Football."



JESÚS BOTELLO HERMOSA

HEAD OF TACTICAL ANALYSIS

Jesús Botello Hermosa joined Gotham FC in 2023 after previously serving as an assistant coach with Real Betis, where his focus was on tactical analysis and designing of game strategies. It was during his time with Real Betis that he worked with Amorós as the club became a competitive force in LIGA F. Botello Hermosa has also served as head of tactical analysis for CD Ronda in Spain, was co-founder and a professor of Sports Management and Sports Scouting at the Royal Football Federation, and was a professor in High Performance in football as well as a coach educator for the Royal Spanish Federation. Botello Hermosa has worked in the broadcasting industry as a La Liga analyst for Mass Media and Real Betis TV, and he is an author of books on tactical analysis.



BRODY SAMS

GOALKEEPER COACH

Brody Sams joined Gotham FC as Goalkeeper Coach in February 2022. In this role, Sams works closely with goalkeepers Michelle Betos, Hensley Hancuff, Mandy Haught, and Abby Smith.

Prior to working in the U.S., the Australian native spent nine years coaching across all levels in Australia, primarily with the professional club Brisbane Roar. Sams has worked in both the women's and men's game, from youth to senior levels.





JULIAN HAIGH

HIGH PERFORMANCE DIRECTOR

Julian Haigh joined Gotham FC in October 2023 with more than 12 years of experience working with professional teams and athletes.

Among Haigh's responsibilities are developing organization-wide programming that includes nutrition, recovery, strength and conditioning, and mental conditioning in addition to overseeing the development of performance recommendations for travel, altitude, training, time zone adjustments, and regular physiological and biomechanical assessments.

Prior to joining the club, Haigh most recently served as the Director of Sports Science for Inter Miami CF in MLS. Haigh also has vast experience in the National Women's Soccer League and women's soccer. From November 2017 to December 2022, he served as Applied Sport Scientist for the U.S. Women's National Team and the NWSL. Additionally, Haigh worked as a High Performance Coach for the Boston Breakers in the NWSL from June 2016 to November 2017.

Before bringing his career to the United States, Haigh spent time in England's professional rugby Super League as the First Team Assistant and Head of Academy Sport Science and Strength and Conditioning for the Widnes Vikings from October 2011 to June 2016. He also worked as an Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach for Liverpool Ladies FC from February 2014 to February 2015, and Sports Science Intern at Everton FC from July 2011 to May 2012.

Haigh graduated from Liverpool John Moores University with a degree as well as a Master's in sports and exercise science, and he holds a USSFF Coaching License. Originally born in Boston, Mass., Haigh grew up in England.



ERIN MORTON

HEAD OF MEDICAL / PHYSICAL THERAPIST

Erin Morton, PT, DPT, Cert. DN, EMT joined Gotham FC in February 2022. A native of Connecticut, Morton returns to the Northeast after several stops on the west coast and the State of Georgia.

Morton spent one year as the Director of Sports Performance at the Millsaps Training Facility in Cairo, Georgia. Prior to that, she worked for PRISM Physical Therapy in Las Vegas after completing a clinical rotation at the UFC Performance Institute where she rehabbed UFC fighters, WNBA players, and Olympians. She also completed clinical rotations on Oahu, where she rehabbed elite college and high school athletes and military personnel, and in Salt Lake City where she gained experience working in an interdisciplinary team of healthcare professionals.

Morton received her Emergency Medical Technician certification during her junior year of high school and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in Health Sciences in three years from Quinnipiac University where she played NCAA Division I golf. She relocated to San Diego county to attend University of St. Augustine's Doctor of Physical Therapy program where she graduated with High Honors.





PHILLIP CONGLETON

HEAD OF SPORTS SCIENCE

Phillip Congleton has been with Gotham FC since 2020. Prior to joining the club, Congleton served as High Performance Coach for the women's soccer team at James Madison University while earning his Master of Science in Exercise Physiology. His duties included interpreting health analytics and video analysis to monitor players' physical performance during games and training sessions. Congleton used this data to implement training, return—to—play, injury prevention and recovery protocols designed to enhance player performance. He was also a Strength and Conditioning Coach for Mary Baldwin University Women's Soccer Team in 2017.



ADRIÁN BENÍTEZ JIMÉNEZ

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

Prior to joining Gotham FC in 2023, Adrián Benítez Jiménez was Head of Performance for Real Betis in Spain's First Division women's league (Liga F) – where he worked with Amorós, a former head coach of Real Betis – and as rehabilitation coach at Real Betis Academy. Among his previous roles, Jiménez was a fitness coach and Academy strength and conditioning coach at Córdoba FC and Marcet Football Academy, and he has also worked with Girona, Real Betis' men's team, Atlético de Madrid Academy, the Argentinian Men's National Team, Basel FC, Granada FC, RCD Mallorca, and Cádiz FC.



2022: Betos signed with Gotham FC in January 2022, and went on to start in all 14 of the matches she appeared in, making 60 saves throughout the season. 2021: Betos wore the captain's armband in Racing Louisville FC's inaugural season where she appeared in 20 matches, logged a league-leading 95 saves and a 4-11-5 record. Betos earned NWSL Save of the Week honors twice, was named NWSL Player of the Week and was recognized on Team of the Month as well. She registered a season-high of 11 saves and earned a shutout in the club's first-ever win. 2018-20: Betos appeared in 12 matches with OL Reign before being selected by Racing Louisville FC in the 2020 NWSL Expansion Draft. 2015-16: In first full season with Portland, she had a standout campaign starting 14 matches. She became the first goalkeeper to score a goal in the NWSL and went on to earn the 2015 NWSL Goalkeeper of the Year honors. 2014: Betos was traded to Portland Thorns FC in exchange for the thirty-fourth pick in the 2014 NWSL College Draft. 2013: She made seven appearances with Seattle Reign FC before being traded to Portland in 2014. 2012: Betos signed with the New York Fury in the Women's Premier Soccer League Elite for the 2012 season. She went on to sign with Apollon Limassol in the UEFA Women's Champions League for the 2012–2013 season. RED BULL ARENA

Red Bull Arena is the benchmark in the North American soccer stadium landscape and sets the standard for other venues of its kind across the continent. The 25,000-seat state-of-the-art facility located in Harrison, New Jersey is the home of Gotham FC of the NWSL and the New York Red Bulls of Major League Soccer.

Opened in March 2010, Red Bull Arena has hosted a number of top club and international squads including the U.S. Women's and Men's National Teams, Argentina, Ecuador, Colombia, Chelsea FC, FC Barcelona, Bayern Munich, Arsenal, Manchester City, Juventus and Tottenham Hotspur FC.

The arena is structured to create a distinct soccer atmosphere as fans in the front row are just 21 feet from the touchlines. Its dynamic roof is a curving structure that wraps the entire arena in an elegant metal shell to create an architectural statement of power and elegance. Red Bull Arena has been awarded the Professional Soccer Field of the Year by Sports Turf Management Association in 2018 and 2021.

In 2022, the Arena hosted 40 soccer matches, including 13 featuring Gotham FC, 19 Red Bulls matches across all competitions, three men's international friendlies, and a friendly between the U.S. Women's National Team and Germany.





RED BULLTRAINING FACILITY

Red Bulls Training Facility is the world-class home for training sessions of NY/NJ Gotham FC, the New York Red Bulls of MLS, New York Red Bulls II, and Red Bulls Academy teams. The facility has hosted various international teams and other club teams training session including the United States National Team, Mexico National Team, and Inter Milan.
