# About Racing Louisville FC

Since starting play in 2021, Racing Louisville FC has blazed a trail as its city's only top-tier professional sports team.

Named as an ode to Louisville's Churchill Downs and the Kentucky Derby, Racing competes in the National Women's Soccer League, the world's premier women's professional soccer league. NWSL stars regularly take part in the FIFA World Cup and the Olympics, among other notable international competitions.

Racing Louisville plays in the largest soccer-specific stadium in the state — 15,304-capacity Lynn Family Stadium in Louisville's Butchertown neighborhood just east of downtown. The stadium also houses Racing's brother club, Louisville City FC of the USL Championship.

Both LouCity and Racing maintain daily operations from the Lynn Family Sports Vision & Training Center, located at Champions Park about two miles east of the stadium. The facility also houses the LouCity & Racing Academy and the LouCity & Racing Foundation, the organization's charitable arm.

John Neace heads a local ownership group as chairman of Soccer Holdings, LLC — the parent company of Louisville City FC and Racing Louisville FC. Former LouCity coach James O'Connor serves as the organization's president.

Racing has so far lifted two trophies, winning The Women's Cup's inaugural tournament in 2021 in a penalty kick shootout over German power Bayern Munich. Louisville traveled to Brazil to win The Women's Cup again in 2025, also prevailing on penalties against Palmeiras. Later in 2025, Racing qualified for the NWSL Playoffs for the first time.

The club's roster features multiple senior internationals, including U.S. Women's National Team members Savannah DeMelo, Taylor Flint and Emma Sears.

## KEY DATES

### 2019

**October 22:** Louisville announced as the NWSL's fourth expansion market.

### 2020

**July 8:** Racing's name and logo designed by the renowned Matthew Wolff were unveiled.

**October 26:** Trade with the Chicago Red Stars made Savannah McCaskill and Yuki Nagasato the club's first players.

**November 12:** Racing acquired rights to 14 players during the 2020 NWSL Expansion Draft.

### 2021

**January 12:** Racing led off the 2021 NWSL College Draft by selecting Emily Fox at No. 1 overall.

**February 2:** With snow cleared off the pitch, Racing was able to hold its first-ever training session.

**April 10:** Cece Kizer scored first and Brooke Hendrix equalized in stoppage time as Racing drew the Orlando Pride, 2-2, in a dramatic inaugural game.

**May 21:** Louisville native Emina Ekic scored a goal and assisted another in Racing's first victory, a 2-0 win over the eventual league champion Washington Spirit.

**July 16:** Racing's new facility, shared with Louisville City FC, opened as the Lynn Family Sports Vision & Training Center.

**August 21:** Racing defeated FC Bayern Munich on penalty kicks, with substitute goalkeeper Katie Lund scoring the game-winner in the 11th round of the shootout, to hoist the first The Women's Cup trophy.

**November 20:** Racing hosts the NWSL Championship with 10,360 on hand at Lynn Family Stadium.

### 2022

**August 2:** Goalkeeper Katie Lund makes 12 saves against OL Reign to break the NWSL single-game record.

**October 1:** Katie Lund set a new NWSL record with 112 regular-season saves.

### 2023

**June 8:** Savannah DeMelo becomes the first Racing Louisville player named NWSL Player of the Month for May.

**June 21:** Savannah DeMelo named to the U.S. Women's National Team roster for the 2023 FIFA World Cup, becoming the first uncapped player since Shannon Boxx in 2003 to go to the tournament with the U.S. She would later start two matches in the tournament.

**September 6:** Kirsten Davis' first-half goal against OL Reign sends Racing to the UKG NWSL Challenge Cup Final, marking the club's first appearance in an NWSL final.

**October 6:** Racing comes back to defeat the Orlando Pride 3-2 — the first time the club overcame a two-goal deficit to win.

**November 30:** Racing announces the hire of Bev Yanez, a 35-year-old former NWSL player, as its new head coach.

### 2024

**March 30:** Racing forward Uchenna Kanu breaks the NWSL record for the fastest brace after scoring twice in six minutes against the Portland Thorns.

**April 20:** Racing scores five goals against the Utah Royals in front of a club record crowd of 11,365 during the annual Thunder Over Louisville celebration.

**October 27:** Racing forward Emma Sears becomes the fourth U.S. national teamer to score and tally an assist in their first international cap.

**October 30:** Lynn Family Stadium hosts its first USWNT match with 13,543 in attendance for a friendly win over Argentina.

### 2025

**November 2:** Racing defeats Bay FC 1-0 to qualify for the NWSL Playoffs for the first time in club history. Ella Hase scored the decisive goal.

**November 8:** Racing competes in the NWSL Playoffs for the first time, falling to the Washington Spirit in a penalty shootout. Notably, Kayla Fischer scored a tying goal in stoppage time.

**November 19:** Racing head coach Bev Yanez wins the NWSL Coach of the Year award. She was the first American and first former NWSL player to win the award.

# Executive Bios

## JOHN NEACE

### CHAIRMAN & CEO

John Neace has served as the chairman of the Soccer Holdings LLC Board of Directors since 2021 after serving as a member of the organization's ownership and board of managers since Louisville City FC's inception in 2014.

Neace exemplifies the qualities of a true entrepreneur. He has demonstrated his persistence and independence of spirit early, when, after growing up in West Newport with his mother and two siblings, Neace put himself through college at Northern Kentucky University and earned his MPA at Xavier University. After that, he built one of the top insurance agencies in the United States, growing his agency from zero revenue to more than \$100 million in just under 20 years.

In addition to his insurance success, Neace demonstrated a willingness to take risks by simultaneously building other businesses, including Talon Logistics, NB Develop, GC International, Old 502 Winery, Falls City Beer and Allterrain Paving & Construction, and franchising businesses Ashley Furniture and 1-800-GOT-JUNK, among others. Excluding insurance, Neace's companies average north of \$100 million in annual sales.

## CAITLYN FLORES MILBY

### GENERAL MANAGER

Caitlyn Flores Milby joined Racing in 2022 as director of operations and took over as interim general manager in November 2024. In May 2025, the club removed the interim tag and appointed her to the post full-time. That season, she led Racing to the club's first NWSL Playoff appearance. Prior joining the Racing Louisville staff, Milby spent two years as the facility manager for Soccer Holdings. She previously served as the National Events Coordinator with the Elite Clubs National League, working in a vital operations role for the top youth soccer circuit in the country. Milby holds a bachelor's degree in sports administration from the University of Louisville, where she played for the soccer team, and a master's degree in sports leadership from Virginia Commonwealth University.





# Lynn Family Stadium

---

Lynn Family Stadium is the largest soccer-specific stadium in Kentucky with seating locations for 11,600 fans and a capacity of 15,304.

Home to Racing Louisville FC and brother club Louisville City FC of the second-tier USL Championship, the stadium boasts 18 luxury suites, premium seating amenities like club, loge seats and ledge tables as well as a significant safe-standing supporter section.

The venue, owned by Soccer Holdings, LLC, is also available for concerts, festivals and other community events. It was named a winner of Greater Louisville Inc.'s Silver Fleur-De-Lis Award, dubbed Business First Louisville's Commercial Real Estate Deal of the Year and nominated for "Stadium of the Year" by StadiumDB.



# Louisville City FC & Racing Louisville FC Training Center

---

Racing Louisville and brother club Louisville City FC operate out of the world-class Louisville City FC & Racing Louisville FC Training Center, one of the top soccer facilities in North America.

In addition to housing day-to-day operations for Racing, LouCity and their front office staff, the facility serves as the home to the Lou City/Racing Academy and the Lou City & Racing Foundation, the 501(c)(3) charitable arm of the organization.

LouCity and Racing moved into the facility in July 2021. The building includes customized locker rooms for both clubs, a weight room, dining hall served by a full-time kitchen staff, media/film room and six playing fields, with two field-and-a-half grass surfaces for the first teams and four state-of-the-art turf pitches used for the youth academy, camps, clinics and community events.

Located at 801 Edith Road, ground was broken Aug. 4, 2020, on the facility, which was built by AML Construction. It's a two-mile drive from Lynn Family Stadium.

Beverly "Bev" Goebel Yanez returns for a third season as the head coach of Racing Louisville FC in 2026. Racing Louisville appointed Yanez as the club's third permanent head coach in November 2023, and she led the club to its first appearance in the NWSL Playoffs in 2025 with a seventh-place finish.

The 2025 team set club records for: wins (10), points (37), goals scored (36) and road victories (5). It finished in seventh place, its highest-ever league standing, earning the first playoff berth in Racing's history. In making the postseason, Yanez became the first person to reach the NWSL Playoffs as both a player and a coach. She was also the first American female coach to make the postseason since 2013. Yanez was named NWSL Coach of the Year, becoming the first American and first former NWSL player to win the award.

In her first season at the helm in 2024, Yanez led Racing to its most wins in a single season (7), its highest-scoring regular season (33 goals) and its most-ever points in the standings (28), narrowly missing the playoffs.

Yanez has led the development a new generation of Racing stars, notably Emma Sears. The former Ohio State forward was the final selection of the second round of the 2024 NWSL draft but but has emerged as a national star, earning regular call ups to the U.S. Women's National Team.

Following Yanez's 10-year professional career, the 36-year-old spent three years in the NWSL as an assistant coach before becoming taking charge of Racing. She spent two seasons with NJ/NY Gotham FC, where she helped lead a run to the 2021 Challenge Cup final and the 2021 NWSL Playoffs. Yanez then moved to Louisville, where she helped Racing reach the 2023 UKG NWSL Challenge Cup final — the club's first appearance in an NWSL final.

A University of Miami alum, Yanez's playing career had a notable spell with NWSL club Reign FC. She won two NWSL Shields, helped Reign to two NWSL finals, was a Best XI selection and a finalist for the league MVP award in 2015 during her time in Seattle. Over six seasons with Reign, she appeared in 123 games, tallying 24 goals and nine assists. Yanez's playing career included stops in Australia, Finland and Japan

# Technical Staff



## Mitchell Sowerby

### FIRST ASSISTANT COACH

Sowerby moved to Racing ahead of the 2024 season after posting a 46-23-11 mark in four years as a collegiate head coach. At Oklahoma Christian, Sowerby's team posted a 10-win turnaround between his first and second seasons, earning a spot in the Division II Lone Star Conference championship in 2022.

He comes to Racing with experience across multiple levels of the sport. In addition to his college coaching work, he served as the academy director at Edmond Soccer Club in the greater Oklahoma City area. He was the camp director for Nike Soccer Camps in Oklahoma City.

He was an assistant coach for three years at his alma mater, Division II program Rogers State University, following his collegiate career. As a player, Sowerby was a three-time all-conference player who registered more minutes than any other non-goalskeeper in Rogers State program history.



## Kiley Polk

### ASSISTANT COACH

Polk joins the Racing first team staff in 2026 after joining the Racing Louisville Academy in 2022.

Polk began her coaching career with the LouCity and Racing Academy in 2020, working part-time as a U8-U10 coach on both the boys and girls sides. She worked her way up the ladder, first as the U8-U10 director and assistant director at the Racing Academy's Oldham County branch, before eventually moving to the main academy office in 2024.

In addition to her academy duties and part-time work with the Racing first team, Polk also was co-head coach of the Racing Louisville W League team in 2025. She led the W League team to a 6-2-2 record, notably with a +23 goal differential. The team finished in second place in the Great Lakes Division.

A Louisville native, Polk played at the University of Louisville and at Sacred Heart Academy.



## Sergio Gonzalez

### GOALKEEPERS COACH

Gonzalez joined Racing in 2021 after a stint as Indiana University's women's associate head coach. He boasts more than two decades of coaching experience, including additional collegiate stops at Dayton, Slippery Rock, NJIT and Ohio State. Internationally, he has also coached goalkeepers for the U-16 and U-17 national teams.

In his time at Racing, Gonzalez has developed the club into one of the top goalkeeper development programs in the NWSL. He coached Michelle Betos, the club's first No. 1, to a standout year, with the veteran goalkeeper finishing second in the league in saves, with 95. Gonzalez has worked closely with star Racing goalkeeper Katie Lund since the club's inception and Lund's selection in the 2020 NWSL Expansion Draft. In two-plus years as Racing's starter, Lund has been among the league's top goalies, with 12 clean

sheets and 214 saves. She was named to the 2023 UKG NWSL Challenge Cup All-Tournament Team.



## Charlie Tuley

### VIDEO ANALYST

Tuley, who has bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Michigan, joined Racing during the 2024 season. He previously worked 14 months as a data and recruitment analyst for the MLS club San Jose Earthquakes and spent time as a data manager for Verified Athletics, a collegiate recruiting database.

**Before Racing Louisville FC:** Prohaska, a native of West Chester, Ohio — about 20 miles north of Cincinnati — joined the Reign for her first professional season in 2025 after a standout career in net at Auburn University. She first joined Seattle as a non-roster invitee before inking a one-year contract days before the campaign's opening match.

The 23-year-old didn't secure a league appearance during her rookie season, with the NWSL's save leader, Claudia Dickey, making all 26 starts for the Reign. However, Prohaska debuted professionally in a July friendly against Japan's Urawa Red Diamonds, which was followed shortly after by a contract extension for 2026.

In her final campaign as a graduate senior (2024), Prohaska led an Auburn team to 13-plus wins for the first time since 2016. A career high 12 clean sheets that season drew even with a single-season school record that was set in 2003. Prohaska, who made 98 appearances for Cincinnati DA at the club level before joining Auburn.



## #2 Lauren Milliet

**2025:** Milliet became the first player in NWSL history to log 100 consecutive matches for one club in April. The defender appeared in 19 matches, providing one assist.

**2024:** Milliet played all but one minute of the regular season and matched her previous season-high with two assists. No player in the NWSL has played more consecutive matches, or made more consecutive starts, since the beginning of the 2022 season. She ranked second in the league (behind teammate Savannah DeMelo) in fouls drawn and seventh in progressive passes. She remains Racing Louisville's all-time leader in appearances, playing in every regular season and UKG NWSL Challenge Cup match in club history.

**2023:** Milliet started every game and played every minute in 2023. She ranked among the league's best in possessions won (1st), recoveries (2nd), fouls won (2nd), possessions won in the defensive third (3rd) and interceptions (8th).

**2022:** For the second straight year, Milliet was the only Racing player to make an appearance in every Challenge Cup and regular-season match. She scored her first professional goal in Racing's Challenge Cup win over the Kansas City Current, then got her first regular-season goal in the club's road victory at NJ/NY Gotham FC.

**2021:** In the club's inaugural season, Milliet was the only player to see game action in all 24 regular season matches. Earning 19 starts, the midfielder recorded 13 shots with three going on target.

**Before Racing Louisville FC:** After being selected 14th by the North Carolina Courage in the 2019 NWSL Draft, Milliet made two appearances in her rookie season. She went on to make four appearances in both the 2020 Challenge Cup and Fall Series. Milliet earned her first career assist against the Orlando Pride to close out 2020.



## #3 Arin Wright

**2025:** Wearing the captain's armband, Wright appeared in 22 matches. The defender scored her first goal in lavender in the club's 2-0 victory over the Orlando Pride in June. She also provided a pair of assists.

**2024:** In her first season with Racing, the Kentucky native appeared in 22 matches, starting 21 of them at either center and outside back. Wright ranked highly across the world's top nine women's soccer competitions in successful take-ons and interceptions.

**Before Racing Louisville FC:** Wright, née Gilliland, comes to Louisville after an eventful eight years with the Chicago Red Stars, where she twice earned first or second Best XI honors and was a 2016 Defender of the Year finalist. She was part of seven Chicago playoff teams, making two trips to the NWSL Championship, including starting in the 2021 final at Lynn Family Stadium.

In all, Wright tallied three goals and 13 assists in 164 appearances across all competitions, leaving Chicago as the club's all-time leader in games started, with 143.

Wright played for her hometown school, becoming one of the most decorated players in University of Kentucky women's soccer history. She's third all-time in both career assists and games played at UK and fourth in goals – and the program's leader in game-winning scores. While there, Wright led Kentucky to its first Sweet 16 in the NCAA Tournament.

In four years with the Cats, Wright was a four-time All-SEC selection, two-time MAC Hermann Trophy finalist and a two-time All-American, ultimately becoming the first Kentucky player to ever be selected in a professional women's soccer draft.

**2025:** Morris joined Racing Louisville in August following a trade with the Washington Spirit. The defender made six appearances, including four starts. She signed a new contract with the club in September, keeping her with Racing through 2028.

**Before Racing Louisville:** The Washington Spirit selected Morris in the first round of the 2024 NWSL Draft, 13th overall, out of Clemson. As a rookie, Morris was a key contributor to a Spirit team that played in the 2024 NWSL Championship game. Morris started in the final, playing 72 minutes in a loss to the Orlando Pride. She also started Washington's quarterfinal win over Bay FC and played 54 minutes off the bench in the semifinal against Gotham FC.

Overall, Morris scored five goals in 2024, tied with Croix Bethune for the most among NWSL rookies that season. The NWSL named Morris the Rookie of the Month for October/November 2024.

In college with the Clemson Tigers, Morris appeared in 80 games over four seasons. As a senior in 2023, she led the Tigers in scoring with 10 goals and also chipped in six assists, earning a second-team United Soccer Coaches All-American selection. Morris also garnered three All-ACC nods, including a first-team selection in 2023.

**International:** Morris has represented the United States Youth National Team at multiple levels, including four calls up to the U-23 team just this season. Morris was included in Emma Hayes' 'Futures Camp' in January 2025, training alongside the United States Women's National Team.

**2025:** In her second year with Racing, Jean made 23 appearances, all starts. The defender scored her first NWSL goal in the club's June 6 victory over the Utah Royals. Jean signed a new contract with Racing through the 2027 season.

**2024:** Jean made eight appearances, including six starts, in her first season with Racing Louisville.

**Before Racing Louisville:** Jean, 26, comes to Louisville after two seasons at Gotham, where she appeared in 32 games, starting 15. Capable of playing multiple positions, Jean helped Gotham win its first NWSL championship a month ago in San Diego.

Prior to her return to the United States, Jean spent two years with Dutch club PSV Eindhoven, winning the KNVB Cup in the Netherlands and twice playing in the UEFA Women's Champions League. She'd previously signed out of college with Danish club FC Nordjylland, but the 2020 season was canceled because of the COVID-19 outbreak and she never appeared in a game.

At Penn State, Jean won a national championship as a freshman, making 26 appearances and earning national all-freshman team and Big Ten all-freshman team honors. Over five years, Jean played in 100 games and won three Big Ten titles

The winger scored her first professional goal on November 1 against Bay FC to help Racing clinch its first playoff berth. Hase also provided the game-winning assist to Emma SearsHear how to pronounce Emma Sears in Racing’s 1-0 victory at San Diego on August 24.

**Before Racing Louisville:** HHase spent the first four years of her college career at Northwestern University – the alma mater of new Louisville teammate Marisa DiGrandeHear how to pronounce Marisa DiGrande – and led the Wildcats to the Sweet 16 in 2022. She was named to the All-Big Ten second team after the 2023 season.

A left-footed outside back, Hase finished second in Division I soccer in her final collegiate season with 13 assists, helping the Blue Devils win the fiercely competitive Atlantic Coast Conference and reach the 2024 College Cup. She was named to the NCAA College Cup All-Tournament team and the All-ACC second team.

In all, Hase totaled 93 collegiate appearances, starting 88 of them and delivering 17 goals and 23 assists. Her 13 assists in 2024 rank third among Duke’s single-season records, and her four assists in the NCAA Tournament were the second-most in Duke history.



## #7 Savannah DeMelo

**2024:** DeMelo appeared in 21 matches, making 20 starts. The versatile midfielder scored five goals, including a brace in a statement 5-1 home win April 20 over the Utah Royals. She also logged two assists, moving into first in career goals (14) and assists (6) for the club. DeMelo was named to May's NWSL Team of the Month.

**2023:** DeMelo started in 20 of her 21 appearances for Racing across all competitions in 2023, registering career-highs in goals scored (8) and assists (3). She ranked among the league's leaders in fouls won (1st), duels won (7th) and chances created from open play (8th). The midfielder was named to the NWSL Team of the Month for May and June and the UKG NWSL Challenge Cup All-Tournament team. She became the first Racing player selected as an NWSL Player of the Month, earning the recognition in May.

**2022:** As a rookie, DeMelo started in all 22 regular-season matches, logging the most minutes of any Louisville field player and finishing first the NWSL in chances created and fouls won. She scored her professional goal on a free kick against the San Diego Wave. The midfielder went on score four times, including a league-best two off a direct free kick, with two assists. DeMelo was named to the NWSL Team of the Month for May and Rookie of the Month of July.

**Before Racing Louisville FC:** During a collegiate career interrupted by an Achilles injury, DeMelo still managed 75 appearances and helped USC to postseason appearances each year she was in the pitch (2017-2018, 2020-2021). Along the way she four times received All-Pac-12 honors and was recognized in 2018 as an All-American.

The Bellflower, Calif., native DeMelo returned to pre-injury form as a senior in 2021, scoring 4 goals and numbering 7 assists while starting all 20 of the Trojans' games. USC finished second in the Pac-12 with an 8-1-2 record in league play.

**International:** After becoming the first uncapped U.S. Women's National Team player named to a World Cup roster since Shannon Boxx in 2003, DeMelo earned her first cap in a match against Wales before the tournament. She earned two starts at the World Cup. As of September 2023, DeMelo has tallied four international appearances.

The defender was named to the NWSL's Best XI of the Month in June. Petersen signed a new contract in June to keep the defender in Louisville through 2027.

**2024:** Having joined the club in September following a trade with the Houston Dash, Petersen made seven appearances, six of them starts, at left back.

**Before Racing Louisville FC:** In her fourth season in the National Women's Soccer League, Petersen has one goal and six assists in 70 appearances, including 48 starts. She spent two years with the Orlando Pride before moving to Houston ahead of the 2023 campaign, starting 12 games this year for the Dash. She was the No. 7 overall pick in the 2020 NWSL Draft.

Primarily a left-sided fullback who can also play center back, Petersen was a fixture in the U.S. Youth National Team system, featuring for teams from the under-14s up to the under-20s. She played for the U-20 national team alongside new Racing teammates Savannah DeMelo and Ellie Jean Hear how to pronounce Savannah DeMelo and Ellie Jean Hear how to pronounce Ellie Jean at the 2016 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup.

At the University of Virginia, Petersen was a two-time All-ACC selection and named to the 2015 ACC All-Freshman team. She made 78 appearances over five years in Charlottesville, helping the Cavaliers reach a national quarterfinal and two Sweet 16s.

Fischer signed a new contract with the club in June, keeping her in Louisville through 2027.

**2024:** Fischer made 24 appearances, including four starts for Racing in her second season as a pro. She scored her first NWSL regular season goal in the club's Aug. 24 home win over the Chicago Red Stars and also tallied an assist. The Ohio native was named to August's NWSL Team of the Month.

**2023:** Made nine starts in 16 total appearances in her first year in the NWSL after being selected in the second round of the 2023 NWSL Draft. Fischer scored her first professional goal against the Houston Dash on June 14 in a 3-0 UKG NWSL Challenge Cup victory, and she notched her first professional assist on Paige Monaghan's game-winner on July 7 against Kansas City Current.

**Before Racing Louisville:** Racing's first pick in the 2023 NWSL draft, Fischer left her mark at Ohio State, tallying 28 goals and 20 assists in five seasons with the Buckeyes. She was a two-time All-Big Ten selection and was named to the Big Ten's All-Freshman team in 2018.

She played collegiately for the Mississippi State Bulldogs.

Hodge made 97 career match appearances over a five-year career at Mississippi State, earning five assists in 8,509 minutes.

Her graduate season of 2024 marked significant success for both Hodge and the Bulldogs. She led the program to its first SEC Regular Season Championship, after the Bulldogs finished the conference schedule unbeaten. The Bulldogs earned a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament and advanced to the Round of 16.

That year, Hodge was a semifinalist for the MAC Herman Trophy and the United Soccer Coaches named her a First Team All-American — both firsts for a Mississippi State player. She also won the SEC Midfielder of the Year award and earned First Team All-SEC nod. She led the Bulldogs in assists that season.

In her senior year of 2023, Hodge earned First Team All-SEC and Second Team All-Southeast Region honors. She served as a captain in each of her final four seasons in Starkville.

From Douglasville, Ga., Hodge was the state's 6A Player of the Year for Alexander High School as a sophomore. She was named Douglas County Player of the Year as a senior. At the club level, Hodge played for the Southern Soccer Academy where she was a five-year team captain. She won the 2018 Disney Showcase and 2015 state title.

In all, she scored 26 goals and tallied 17 assists over a span of 80 appearances in a four-year collegiate career in Morgantown.

White was named a third-team All-American by the United Soccer Coaches in 2025. The organization also named her to the All-Midwest Region Team, and she earned All-Big 12 First Team honors as well.

As a junior in 2024, White earned All-Big 12 Second Team honors after finishing the season tied for the team-lead with seven goals.

The Mountaineers made the NCAA Tournament in three of White's four seasons.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, White played for Winton Woods High School and Cincinnati United at the club level. She was also a high school basketball player for Winton Woods.

She comes from a family with a soccer and sports background. Her older sister, Morgan, plays soccer professionally in France for Stade de Reims after finishing a collegiate career at Arkansas and Marshall. Her older brother, Michael, played soccer at the collegiate level.

A decorated collegian, McMahon earned the Big Ten Tournament MVP as a senior in 2024 and earned selections to the All-Region second team (2023, 2024), All-Big Ten second team (2024), All-Pac-12 first team (2022, 2023), and Pac-12 All-Freshman Team (2021).

At the high school level, McMahon was Indiana's Gatorade Player of the Year as senior at Guerin Catholic in 2020-21. She was a United Soccer Coaches All-American and was selected to play in the 2020-21 High School All-American game.

She played at the youth level with Indiana Fire Juniors. She also spent her summers in the pre-professional USL W League with Indy Eleven.

She scored her first goal in an April 20 win over the Utah Royals and later set the club record for goals scored by a rookie with five. Sears twice earned NWSL goal of the week honors. She ranked in the league's top 10 in dribbles into the penalty area, progressive dribbles and successful take-ons, proving herself as one of the top playmakers in the NWSL.

**Before Racing Louisville:** The Ohio native came to Louisville from Ohio State, where she starred for five seasons, totaling 25 goals and 15 assists in 83 appearances. She ranks 12th in Ohio State program history in career goals, 11th in career points (65) and 10th in career shot attempts (213), and she left college as one of only four players in program history to register multiple hat tricks.

With the Buckeyes, Sears earned All-Big Ten honors in three different seasons, including first-team recognition in 2023. She helped lead Ohio State to four NCAA Tournament berths, including a second-round appearance in 2022, when she scored the game-winner in an opening-round win over Bucknell.

**International:** Through March 2026, the Racing Louisville forward has earned 17 caps for the United States Women's National Team, including six goals and three assists. In October 2025, Sears scored her first international hat trick against New Zealand.

After earning her first call-up during the October 2024 window, Sears became the fourth player in USWNT history to score a goal and tally an assist in their international debut, helping the Americans rally to defeat Iceland in an October 27 friendly.



**2024:** Bloomer made two starts during the NWSL x LIGA MX Femenil Summer Cup. The goalkeeper made a pair of penalty saves in a tournament shootout against the Orlando Pride.

**2023:** Bloomer spent the offseason on loan with A-League Women club Western Sydney Wanderers, where she made 14 appearances and registered a 77.3% save percentage.

Bloomer made one matchday roster for Racing in 2023 before missing the remainder of the season with a back injury.

The Las Vegas native led the league in aerial duels won and win percentage, interceptions and tackles won while also ranking third in blocks. Flint also ranked in the top 10 in passes into the final third and progressive passes. She was named to the NWSL Team of the Month for March/April.

**Before Racing Louisville FC:** Flint (née Kornieck) joins Racing after two successful seasons in San Diego, where she totaled six goals and four assists in 45 appearances between the NWSL regular season and UKG NWSL Challenge Cup. She played a key role in the Wave becoming the first expansion team in league history to make the playoffs in its debut campaign in 2022, and a year later she helped San Diego win the NWSL Shield, given to the first-place team through the regular season.

A three-year NWSL veteran, Flint was the No. 3 pick in the 2020 NWSL Draft, the highest draft selection in Orlando Pride history. The University of Colorado legend is the program's all-time leader in career assists and points while sitting second in career goals. She was an All-American, four-time all-Pac-12 selection and Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, helping CU to three NCAA Tournament second-round appearances.

She spent the COVID-19-interrupted season on loan with MSV Duisburg in Germany before returning to debut for Orlando in 2021, tallying three goals and three assists in 26 appearances across all competitions.

Flint scored her first NWSL goal in her debut – the April 10, 2021, NWSL Challenge Cup match against Racing at Lynn Family Stadium that was the first game in Louisville club history.

# NWSL MEDIA POLICY

Media credentials and access will be granted only to individuals with a legitimate working function at a game, training session or event. The bearer must be on a specific assignment. Credentials are non-transferable. Any unauthorized use of a credential subjects the bearer to ejection from the stadium. Resale or attempted resale is grounds for seizure and cancellation.

The following actions may result in seizure of credential and/or ejection of its wearer from the stadium or training facility:

- Requesting autographs at any time.
- Taking photographs with players/coaches

Using credential for family or friends of a working media member

- Conduction of unauthorized interviews
- Unprofessional behavior (Cheering in the press box, consumption of alcoholic beverages, failure to abide by posted rules, etc.)

## TREATMENT OF CREDENTIALLED MEDIA

**Postgame Media Access:** Players from both teams will be available to media post-game in a mix-zone located outside the team locker rooms or in a location near the field of play. The mix-zone will begin 10 minutes after the conclusion of the match. Locker rooms will not be open to media at any point.

Team PR directors should be present to indicate the beginning and end of media access to players, and ensure media have access to the head coach and players after the match. All players are highly encouraged to be available to media post-game.

All regulations about post-game media access should be clearly communicated to team staff and security to ensure a secure environment.

No individuals other than League or Club representatives shall be allowed in Club locker rooms following a game.

Under no circumstances shall any club and/or its players discriminate in any fashion against an accredited member of the media based upon race, creed, sex or national origin.

**Seating Access:** Accredited media members will have access to the stadium, professional workrooms and stadium seating, if available. During the match, accredited media will have access to the press box which will be restricted to only those accredited media members.

In addition, each stadium should have a Press Box capable of seating no less than TEN (10) people, with separate areas for working press and electronic broadcasters, and sufficient power outlets for all needs. If possible, all accredited media members should be given a seat in the press box.

All credentialed media shall be seated in media seating areas, consistent with treatment afforded comparable media. In addition, all members of the media are to be afforded equal treatment and access to facilities and personnel, regardless of sex.

When the press box is fully occupied by working media, referee assessors or in-stadium observers shall be provided seating with a desk or table shielded from the weather and a vantage point to view replays (if available) from any telecast. The specific location may be determined by the Home Team but must provide these minimum accommodations.

In order to maintain the integrity of the working press box, seating is specifically reserved for media members. All other individuals (including player agents, VIP's and administrators) should be seated in overflow booths or assigned stadium seats.

**Traveling Media:** Members of the working media who travel with a visiting team are not to be treated in a discriminatory manner with regard to seating or any other privilege or facility accorded to the home media. Comparable seating and equipment should apply to home and road media (print and electronic).

**Media Access to Practice:** Clubs are encouraged to make all practices open to media. If a practice is closed, clubs must grant a 15-minute media access period at the start or end of practice, as well as making the coach and players available for interviews following the conclusion of practice. Clubs are strongly encouraged to ensure that ballwork is at least part of the 15-minute access period. If practices are open to the media, as defined above, they must be open to all media; if practices are closed to the media, they must be closed to all media.

Clubs violating the media access policies on practice days will be subject to fines or other discipline at the discretion of NWSL Commissioner.

**Guidelines for Photographers and Camera Operators:** All photographers and television camera operators must stay behind the field boards at all times, unless released by the on-site photo marshal. The only exception to the field board rule will be when a staff photographer, a national rights-holder or NWSL has a crew at a game. These entities will be allowed to shoot from the area between the field boards and the touch lines in the area bounded by the top of the 18-yard box and the end line.

Each photographer will be permitted to use one monopod — but no tripods. No seats other than “lawn-type” photographer seats will be permitted.

Stand-alone remote units will not be permitted at any time on or around the goal posts. Units mounted on the top of field boards behind the end line will be permitted at the stadium’s discretion, provided the equipment does not interfere with the clear display of the field board and does not impede the operation of broadcast equipment.

Live television crews located on the baseline or sideline will be limited to two (2) people — a camera operator and a cable-puller — and ENG crews will be limited to one (1) person. In either case, the crew must maintain actual possession of the camera and any other equipment during all game action. Cameramen and cable-pullers from all television crews must remain off the playing field at all times.

**Photographer Access to field:** Photographers and camera operators shall be permitted in the area between the field boards and the touch lines in the area bounded by the top of the 18-yard box and the end line (a C-shape that extends from the top of the 18, back behind the goal, and to the top of the 18 on the opposite side of the field).

Once situated, no movement between the two halves of the field shall be permitted until halftime. Changes in this policy will be allowed in cases where stadium facilities dictate alterations. No photographers shall be allowed to move from end to end on the bench side of the field.

**Photographer Identification:** In addition to their regular credential, it is strongly recommended that photographers and camera crews be issued with colored bibs or armbands. This makes them easy to identify, and they would presumably enjoy quick and easy access to their designated areas. This will necessitate a special area in or near the stadium where they can pick up their bibs, on presentation of their accreditation, either the day before the match or on game day, at the time media gates are opened. If they are not to be allowed to keep the bib, then it should be exchanged for a press card to be picked up following the game, or else signed out.

**Photography Work Area:** A work area should be provided for photographers, near the field where appropriate, with high-speed internet access. The size of the room may vary, but it should be sizeable enough for at least 5 – 10 people to work on desktops/tables. Like the press section of the stands, the photographers’ work room should have sufficient electrical sockets and compatible with the equipment being used for transmission.

**Accreditation:** Care should be taken when processing credential requests for photographers shooting for commercial agencies. NWSL does not permit the accreditation of photographers shooting specifically for commercial agencies. However, since many agencies offer editorial and commercial sales options (Getty Images, AP, Reuters, etc.) this must be handled on a case-by-case basis.

### **Non-Rights Holder Video Guidelines**

**Video Footage:** All rights to match footage including all applicable copyrights belong to NWSL and its rights holders who broadcast each specific match. NWSL has one rights holders that will broadcast select matches in 2017: Lifetime. If an organization is interested in recording video footage at a NWSL match for non-news gathering purposes they should contact NWSL Communications.

## **TELEVISION BROADCASTERS**

**Game Action:** Television broadcasters can use footage of NWSL events obtained either via 1) their own recording or 2) action dubbed from a NWSL rights holder broadcast (Lifetime) with credit only in connection with its regularly scheduled news programming within a week of the game. This footage should not exceed two (2) minutes. Highlights aired as part of a continuous news program should not be longer than one (1) minute per 30-minute segment. Credits: NWSL Media / Lifetime (for the Game of the Week); NWSL Media (for all other games).

**Filming – Game Action:** For televised events, non-rights holders / ENG cameras may record the first 15 minutes of each half (from 00:00 to 15:00 and 45:00 to 60:00 on the game clock). For non-televised events, non-rights holders / ENG cameras may record the entire game but are still subject to the aforementioned limits. This includes events that are web streamed live online.

**Filming – Interviews and Scene Sets:** There is no limit to the gathering of footage pre-game, at halftime and post-game. All footage gathered is subject to the usage guidelines indicated in this document.

**Filming – In Seating Area:** Video cameras looking to shoot in the concourse or seating area must contact home team and NWSL in advance of the event for approval.

**Previews or Advances:** In advance of a NWSL event, television broadcasters can use two (2) minutes of archival game action to preview an upcoming event. In the local/regional markets, broadcasters should mention the time and location of the game along with their report. Outside of the local markets, broadcasters should mention the time and broadcast information.

**Television Broadcasters' Web Sites:** Video produced for air as part of regular programming that is simulcast or archived online must be accompanied by a link to [NWSLsoccer.com](http://NWSLsoccer.com). Content produced exclusively for the Internet is subject to the guidelines for Online Video.

## ONLINE VIDEO

**Game Action:** Online organizations (including print publications that post video online) are not permitted to film or use game action video without prior written approval by NWSL Media. Game action includes any footage of the field, teams, etc., following the beginning of the television broadcast window. Only video of off-field activities (i.e. interviews, training sessions) may be recorded.

**Non-Game Video:** Any video posted online that is recorded as part of media access is limited to the use of eight (8) minutes per day/activity date. Online video may not incorporate integrated advertising and must be accompanied by links to [NWSLsoccer.com](http://NWSLsoccer.com).

**Professional Presentation:** Online video is expected to be recorded, edited and presented in a professional manner. Video must be presented/hosted on an organization's website, and not solely on a site provided by a third-party (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, Facebook, etc.).

**Online Video Sites:** Organizations who regularly post video to online video sites (i.e. YouTube, Vimeo, etc.) may not include advertising with video gathered as a result of media access. Allowing users to embed these videos is not permitted, and the description of any video must include a link to [NWSLsoccer.com](http://NWSLsoccer.com)
